LCDR Osvaldo Vera

Lieutenant Commander Vera assumed the duties as Commanding Officer, MSST Houston (91104) in June of 2020. Prior to assuming command, he served as the MSST Force Manager within the Deployable Specialized Forces Section at Atlantic Area Command. He was responsible for six MSSTs in execution of Ports, Waterways and Coastal Security, Drug Interdiction, and Migrant Interdiction missions. He developed Adaptive Force Packages to support 400+ emergent and planned operations including presidential security missions, National Special Security Events, five major hurricane responses, and Joint Interagency Task Force South Drug Interdiction missions on U.S. Coast Guard, U.S. Naval, and Allied ships.

Prior to his assignment to Atlantic Area, he served as Command Center Chief at Sector Corpus Christi where his duties included Search and Rescue Mission Coordinator, Command Duty Officer, and Regional Coordinating Mechanism Operations Officer. He facilitated execution of all Coast Guard missions and coordinated efforts with Federal, State, local emergency responders, and port industry partners for emergent operations in an area encompassing 400 nautical miles of waterways, three ports, including the third largest U.S. petrochemical complex and the maritime boundary line with Mexico.

He previously served as Waterside Security Division and Maritime Law Enforcement/Force Protection Division Chief at MSST Los Angeles/Long Beach where he led nationwide maritime security deployments and increased security of the nation's busiest container port. He supported operations that included enforcement of security zones, High Interest Vessel boardings, protection of military outloads and major marine events, and augmented shoreside security at waterfront facilities. His efforts supported critical force protection for nationally significant events and ensuring delivery of vital military supplies.

LCDR Vera enlisted in 2000 and served at Air Station Sacramento prior to completing Officer Candidate School in 2005. His previous staff tours include assignment within the Evaluations Branch at Personnel Service Center, Officer Personnel Management Division. He also served as Command Duty Officer while assigned at the U.S. Embassy, Nassau Bahamas, Operations Bahamas, Turks and Caicos where he coordinated assets including U.S. Coast Guard, U.S. Army, Drug Enforcement Administration, Customs and Border Protection, and Royal Bahamas Police and Defense Forces supporting multinational multiagency counter-narcotics interdiction operations.

LCDR Vera graduated from U.S. Naval War College with a Masters of Arts in Defense and Strategic Studies, American Military University with a Masters of Arts in Public Administration, University of Delaware with a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology, and Joint Forces Staff College where he completed the requirement of Joint and Combined Warfighting School - Joint Professional Military Education Level Phase II.

TCC MEETS VIA ZOOM— August 7, 2021

On August 7, the MOAA Texas Council of Chapters (TCC) held its third quarterly meeting of 2021. Normally the quarterly meetings are held in conference at a location in Texas. COVID-19 however, has altered normal practice. The meeting was conducted via zoom as has been the case all year.

TCC President Jim Cunningham from the San Antonio chapter, after a long and arduous illness, returned to lead the council and set the agenda. Highlights of the meeting were the reports from the various members of the council concerning activities and events in their chapters over the last three months. I was happy to report that in the Houston area, the chapter had recruited 6 new members (a total of 13 over the course of this year), had published 3 monthly newsletters, and had been recognized by MOAA National as a 5star Levels of Excellence (LOE) chapter for the second year in a row. Also, the chapter was further recognized by National by being awarded a cash prize for its community outreach efforts. Finally, I reported that once the guarter ended on September 30, the

chapter would have completed its third monthly members' meeting and luncheon featuring a guest speaker. This program of meetings/luncheons with guest speakers represents an important aspect of the chapter's commitment to provide meaningful service to its members.

On future events the reminder of this year, I reported that the chapter will continue to hold its monthly members' meetings, would conduct its annual members meeting and election of officers for 2022 and would publish its award winning monthly newsletter. I reported that the chapter would play its part in community-wide activities by participating in Retiree Appreciation Day at Joint Reserve Base Ellington on October 9 and by attending the annual Houston Military Affairs Committee (HMAC) Armed Forces Day Military Banquet and Ball (delayed from May) on October 16. The US Navy has the honor this year of organizing the gala event. Finally, the chapter will play its part in meetings of MOAA's Surviving Spouse virtual chapter led by our own Judith Thomas. It is my pleasure to report that Mrs. Thomas has been repeatedly singled out as a mainstay of the surviving spouse chapter and we are honored to have her as a member of our chapter.

The TCC will hold its 4th quarter meeting in a face-to-face in person meeting in San Antonio on December 6 and 7. This will also be the TCC's annual members meeting and banquet. All MOAA members are welcomed and encouraged to attend. Additional information will be forthcoming soon.





Surviving Spouse Corner

There are two programs I would like to bring to your attention.

The United States Vietnam War Commemoration Commission has a program to recognize Surviving Spouses of deceased Veterans who served honorably on active duty in the U.S. Military between November 1,1955 and May 15, 1975, no matter where that service occurred.

In addition to the Surviving Spouse Lapel Pin, there is a Certificate of Honor from the Commission. Through a Commemorative Partner, I am authorized to present these Pins and Certificates to Surviving Spouses. If you have not received the Pin and Certificate, I would be honored to present them to you at a MOAA meeting or at a location of your choosing. Another great history lesson not taught in school...

THE OIL PATCH WARRIORS OF WORLD WAR II

Seventy-five years ago this month, a Band of Roughnecks went abroad on a top secret mission into Robin Hood's stomping grounds to punch oil wells to help fuel England's war machines.

It's a story that should make any oilman or woman proud.

The year was 1943 and England was mired in World War II. U-boats attacked supply vessels, choking off badly needed supplies to the island nation. But oil was the commodity they needed the most as they warred with Germany.

A book "The Secret of Sherwood Forest: Oil Production in England During World War II" by Guy Woodward & Grace Steele Woodward was published in 1973, and tells the obscure story of the American oil men who went to England to bore wells in a top secret mission in March 1943.

England had but one oil field, in Sherwood Forest of all places. Its meager output of 300 barrels a day was literally a drop in the bucket of their requirement of 150,000 barrels a day to fuel their war machines.

Then a top secret plan was devised: to send some Americans and their expertise to assist in developing the field. Oklahoma based Noble Drilling Company, along with Fain-Porter signed a one year contract to drill 100 wells for England, merely for costs and expenses.

42 drillers and roughnecks from Texas and Oklahoma, most in their teens and early twenties volunteered for the mission to go abroad. The hands embarked for England in March 1943 aboard the HMS Queen

Elizabeth. Four National 50 drilling rigs were loaded onto ships but only three of them made landfall; the Nazi U-boats sank one of the rigs en route to the UK.



The contract fulfilled, the American oil men departed England in late March 1944. But only 41 hands were on board the return voyage. Herman Douthit, a Texan derrick-hand was killed during the operation. He was laid to rest with full military honors, and remains the only "civilian" to be buried at The American Military Cemetery in Cambridge.

"The Oil Patch Warrior," a seven foot bronze statue of a roughneck holding a four foot pipe wrench stands near Nottingham England to honor the American oil men's assistance and sacrifice in the war. A replica was placed in Ardmore Oklahoma in 2001.

It is by no means a stretch to state that without this American mission, we might all be speaking German today.
